Dr. John B. Harer joined the faculty of the Department of Library Science at East Carolina University in the Fall of 2004, and earned his tenure and promotion to Associate Professor in the Fall of 2010. His research interests and expertise are in the areas of quality improvement in academic libraries. His PhD is in Educational Administration from Texas A&M University and his dissertation examined Continuous Quality Improvement performance measures for academic libraries using a Delphi panel research method. Dr. Harer has also written extensively on intellectual freedom. He was a member of the American Library Association's Intellectual Freedom Committee and has written three monographs and several articles on intellectual freedom. He is an active member of the National Storytelling Network, and presented a program on the Alexander Technique for storytellers at the 2010 National Storytelling Conference. Because of his passion for storytelling, he also wrote the monograph *The Alexander Technique Resource Book*, a method for performance improvement for storytellers. Dr. Harer's teaching focus is in intellectual freedom, storytelling, and research methods, and he often teaches the foundations course.

Going Back to the Future: Are Libraries There Yet? Dr. Harer will be speaking on the future of libraries in North Carolina and relating information on the ALA accreditation process that ECU's Library Science program has completed.

Emergencies Happen: Being Prepared for Anything – Patricia Dew (New Hanover County Public Library)

In libraries, emergencies happen. From bookdrop fires to medical situations, tornadoes to gas leaks, drunken patrons to active shooters, librarians see all kinds of emergency situations. Do you and your facility have a plan? What should you do to protect yourself and your library patrons in an emergency? Learn what you can do to be prepared for whatever your "normal-day-at-the-library" turns out to be. Topics include making a plan, sheltering versus evacuating, calling 911, and keeping things from getting out of hand in the first place.

Nice Place You Have Here: Applying User Experience Methods to Library Spaces and the Web – Mark Sanders & Katy Kavanagh Webb (East Carolina University – Joyner Library)

ECU Libraries have undertaken multiple initiatives to better serve their community by applying User Experience (UX) methods to update their spaces, services, and web presence. Two administrators from ECU Libraries will discuss UX projects that have transformed library spaces including signage, maps, seating, student-centered spaces, technologies, outlets, aesthetics, and policies. Websites are also a prime place where UX can have a positive impact. In addition to providing practical advice and tips, this presentation will delve into the methods used to gather data and feedback from users as well as best practices and cost information for updating furnishings and physical spaces.

The Real Deal: Finding and Using Primary Sources – Patricia Burns (St. Mark Catholic School Library)

This session will focus on the best resources for locating primary sources. Emphasis will be placed on creative ways to use primary sources in instruction, including the development of critical thinking skills, user engagement and construction of knowledge. The session will include discussion of copyright issues.

Advertising the Library by Hook, Crook, and Internet – Robert Arndt & June Power (University of North Carolina at Pembroke – Mary Livermore Library)

Most libraries advertise their services in numerous ways. With the public being bombarded with visual messages, how do you make your events stand out and attract attention? At UNC Pembroke, the Mary Livermore Library advertises in a variety of low-cost ways including use of an in-house message board, and social media sites such as Facebook, Pinterest, Twitter, and Tumblr. The session will cover the type of events and services to advertise, selection of formats for presentation, methods to attract the visual attention of both the library goer and the casual viewer, and the software and equipment needed to produce the final product.

Teach It Where They Are – Peggy Higgins

(Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College – Holly Library)

How does a medium-sized community college on a tight budget more than double its number of library instruction sessions per year in less than a decade? We at Holly Library use our feet, our vehicles, our adaptability skills, and a growing catalog of LibGuides to meet the needs of our faculty and students, no matter where they are. With only two full-time instruction librarians and a dwindling number of part-time librarians, we've managed to keep up with the growing demand for our services by working smart, not working ourselves to death. 30+ Mobile Apps for Librarians – Sana Moulder & Bryson Kofp

(Cumberland County Public Library)

With more than a billion apps available, it's difficult to tell which ones are good. We'll share 30+ apps for library customers, info pros, and newbies. For Android and Apple devices, these apps will change the way you search, discover, access, and view information in and beyond the library walls.

Port City BizInfo – Beth Kaylor

(University of North Carolina Wilmington – Randall Library)

This session will provide an introduction to the resources available from Randall Library's new Port City BizInfo service. Port City BizInfo is designed to be a gateway and a guide to the wealth of resources and services available to anyone searching for business data, statistics and information. This session will show attendees how they can use the service to assist users, or refer users for further assistance.

Project Management: Tips and Tools – Laura Wiegand

(University of North Carolina Wilmington – Randall Library)

The session will present project management tips, geared towards busy librarians, gleaned from formal project management principles, as well as review some technology tools that you can use in project management to foster collaboration, communication and organization.

The Ultimate Reading Challenge & Read Around the Clock – Suzanne Moore

(Ashe County Public Library)

These programs use LibGuides to encourage patrons and staff to diversify reading and share books, reflections, and ideas with each other. *The Ultimate Reading Challenge* showcases readers' reviews on books they discovered by meeting unique requirements. *Read Around the Clock* is a new monthly book club that was inspired by a clock our Friends of the Library created that tells time using novels. Both of these programs are low-cost and easy to replicate.

ACPL Zoom Pass Program – Becky Fabbri (Alamance County Public Libraries)

ACPL offers a museum pass program that allows patrons to check out passes for free to educational and life skills organizations. Currently we offer passes to the Conservators Center, Children's Museum of Alamance County, NC Zoo, Aquatic Centers and the Durham Museum of Life and Science. This program is sponsored by the Friends of the Alamance County Public Libraries.

Branded – Vonzell Yeager & John Crawford

(University of North Carolina Wilmington – Randall Library)

This poster will outline Randall Library's initial brand development, the creation of marketing processes and how we market events, construction issues and the showcasing of resources to the various constituencies of the library.

Collaboration between Libraries and Schools: Improving High-School Student Awareness of Local Library Resources – Melissa Raymer & Beth Kaylor (University of North Carolina Wilmington – Randall Library); Jacob Deininger (Cape Fear Community College Library); Susan DeMarco (New Hanover County Public Library)

Librarians from UNCW, CFCC and NHCPL created a program to reach out to high school seniors in New Hanover County who were required to complete graduation projects. The effort aimed to introduce students to the variety of services and resources available in local libraries. Librarians visited each of the four area high schools to provide brief instruction sessions to seniors and, in 2011, surveyed students before the visits and after the projects were completed.

Freedom Riders Exhibit – Joann Absi (Eugene Ashley High School Library);

Roberta Aurelia Troy (Charles P. Murray Middle School)

This poster portrays an interschool collaboration to bring the Freedom Riders exhibit from the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History to our schools in preparation for Black History Month.

One Stop Shopping: "Ask-A-Librarian" Technology in the Electronic Medical Record – Allison Matthews (SEAHEC Medical Library)

This poster illustrates how the librarians added an "Ask a Librarian" button inside the hospital's electronic medical record (EMR). The primary objective was to increase requests from the medical center's healthcare providers for medical information. The secondary objective was to embed the library further in the EMR. The physicians and nurses "live" in the EMR and the librarians wanted the electronic library collection of medical journals, books, and databases available and easily accessible to this user group.
