I. Newspapers (Free & NC Live)

 - State Library – North Carolina

 - Historic North Carolina Digital
Newspaper Collection ([Randall Library](#) &
[NC Live](#) Database)
- 1) Go to digitalnc.org and choose “newspapers.” Then choose “African-American papers.” Which papers are from Wilmington? Find an interesting news story.
 - 2) Go to digital.ncdcr.gov and under “Collections” choose “North Carolina Newspapers.” Click the Green “Browse” button and under “Title” click “Wilmington Gazette.” Find an ad for a runaway slave.

II. UNCW Digital Collections (Free)

- 1) Search “Jervay,” “Tom Jervay,” and “T.C. Jervay” in the search box for the Civil Rights in Southeast North Carolina Collection.
 - 2) Click “Browse” from the Oral Histories page. On the left, pick subcategory “Williston High School.” Browse one oral history.

III. North Carolina Maps (Free)

- <https://web.lib.unc.edu/nc-maps/index.php>
 - “K-12” tab at top
 - “Sanborn Maps” at top
- 1) Go to the Sanborn maps tab at the top and then click on New Hanover County. Find the earliest map and choose one city block. What buildings were there, and what purpose did they serve?
 - 2) Look at the 1915 map and attempt to find the location where D.C. Virgo is today. What was there then?

IV. North Carolina Documents (Free)

 - Court reports, Crime Reports, Agricultural Statistics, Vital Statistics, Session Laws, North Carolina Manual, etc.
- 1) In the main search box, type “negro” and explore resources.
 - 2) In the main search box, type “colored” explore resources.

- Select NC Topics:
 - State Symbols > State Symbols Coloring Pages
 - Anchor (North Carolina Digital Textbook)
 - Geography & Places

- 1) Click on the Gazetteer at the bottom of the “Geography and Places” name. Search “Sea Breeze” and “Navassa.”
- 2) Click on the “Educators” link in the “Anchor” tab. What happened on this day in North Carolina history?

Choose marker D-120 . Who was William B. Gould?
 - 2) Explore marker D-114. Who was Abraham Galloway?
